Microsoft will stop providing support for Windows 10 on October 14, 2025

Windows 10 support is ending. Are you ready? This guide will help you determine if your existing desktops, laptops, tablets, and other devices running on Windows 10 can be supported by the new Microsoft Windows 11 operating software.

Why Do You Need To Upgrade?



You and your users will no longer be able to get technical support if a problem related to the legacy software system occurs.

Microsoft will stop providing updates and critical security patches to the end-of-life (EOL) software.

What this means for your business is that while you'll still be able to run your devices on Windows 10, you may start to experience glitches, slow processing speeds, or even compatibility problems with your other hardware and software.

It also means that cybercriminals can pounce on this prime opportunity to launch a cyberattack, sometimes as soon as the same day support ends.

How Much Does It Cost?



Upgrading to Windows 11 is free for devices running Windows 10 that meet the minimum system requirements provided by Microsoft.

However, not all hardware is supported, which can make the upgrade process challenging.

It's also why you should start preparing now to check whether your devices can support the new OS and begin transitioning your hardware as soon as possible.

What Are The Minimum Requirements To Upgrade?



Operating System: Running a supported version of Windows 10

Processor: 1GHz or faster with 2 or more cores on a compatible 64-bit processor

RAM: 4 GB or more

Storage: 64 GB or more

Graphics Card: Compatible with DirectX 12

How Do I Know If My Device Will Support Windows 11?

To verify if your device meets the Windows 11 requirements, choose one of the following methods:

A

Use The Microsoft PC Health Check App

Start by downloading and running the Microsoft [PC Health Check app](#). This will give you a compatibility report to determine if your device can be supported by Windows 11.

B

Check Via Your Windows Update Settings

Windows 11 is available as an update on compatible Windows 10 systems. You can verify this on your device by going to **Settings > Update & Security > Windows Update** and click **Check for updates**. If your device is eligible, you'll see an option to upgrade to Windows 11.

| 1 | What happens if my devices don't meet the minimum hardware requirements? | If your devices don't meet the minimum hardware requirements, you'll need to purchase new ones. Microsoft strongly discourages installing Windows 11 on unsupported devices, as you won't receive updates or support. |
| 2 | Will my peripherals and accessories work with Windows 11? | Yes, if these devices worked with Windows 10 then they should also work with Windows 11. |
| 3 | Will I lose my data when I upgrade to Windows 11? | Upgrading from Windows 10 to Windows 11 on supported devices will have no effect on your personal files, accounts, settings, or installed applications. Still, you should check to be sure that your programs are compatible with the new OS, since Microsoft will automatically remove any incompatible programs. |
